I can remember many occasions in past years when committee members paid their subs in December to ensure outstanding bills could be met! I hasten to add that we do not require this kind of response at present although early payment is always appreciated.

Your support over recent years has been crucial to the Club's success and will continue to be so in the future. A great deal was achieved last year, but much more needs to be done.

A promise I made in my first year of office was one of improving communications between the Committee and the membership. The coming year will see the greatest challenge: the

extension of the clubhouse to enable us to offer up-todate facilities for all our activities.

The General Committee (plus its sub-committees), after 18 months of debate and deliberation, have agreed to a final plan which fulfils all the aims originally set. I wish to thank them for their fortitude and patience.

One or two minor planning changes have to be agreed by North Norfolk District Council, but we are reliably informed that they will agree to an amendment to the original planning application, which was passed.

It is my intention, if all the pieces of the jigsaw fall into place, to give a presentation to the membership immediately after the AFM on March 26th, having consulted the Trustees of the Club in advance.

If you continue to support your Club this year as you have done in the past, I really believe that, financially, building the extension is a goal which is well within our reach. A financial sub-committee is looking at all the various options open to us. This programme is an absolute necessity if we wish to ensure the long term future of Wells Sailing Club.

May I, in conclusion, wish you all a very successful and, perhaps even more important, an enjoyable sailing season.

CLUB HOUSE EXTENSION UPDATE

A lot of work (call it brain churning) has been going on behind the scenes, since early 2004 when the Clubhouse Extension Project was first rolled out.

Shortly thereafter, sub-committees were formed to advance the feasibility and development work required, as well as look at the all-important financial aspects of the project.

The guidelines for the project given by the General Committee were:

- To provide access to both men's and ladies' changing facilities from the outside when the main Clubhouse areas are closed.
- Both men's and ladies' changing areas to be increased significantly in size and their facilities to be totally upgraded.
- Enlarge and upgrade the kitchen area, after taking into account the considerations of the House Committee with respect to its future envisaged usage.
- The Bar area to be enlarged and provision be made for the future secure storage of bar stock and supplies.
- Make the main Social Area larger, in accordance with future requirements and usage.
- Improve the access to the Clubhouse, particularly for the disabled, and also to provide a disabled toilet facility.
- Increase the amount of secure storage space for sailing equipment and cleaning materials, etc.

No small task for the sub-committees to take onboard, as the drawings went from concept stage, through much serious debate, to a broad outline of the extension encompassing all of the above requirements. (Builder's pencil, one eye closed and elevated thumb to drawing board, proper paper, a 0.3mm pen and decent ruler, to be exact)

With all of the above criteria met, in the autumn of last year, outline plans were presented to the General Committee and approval was given to take the project to the planning and detailed costing stage. Plans were submitted to NNDC and outline Planning Permission was subsequently granted in November.

Next came the hard bit of finalising the internal arrangements and, again after many meetings, the development committee felt that the original planned size of new changing rooms and kitchen needed further revision. Every permutation was considered but it became very apparent that we needed to extend further (back to the thumb and squinty-eye stage – nearly). The result being we have now increased the planned footprint of the extension by a further metre to the south to provide the additional space needed.

Revised plans were passed by the General Committee in January and we have now moved onto the next phase, as the finance sub-committee investigates funding the project.

A project update will be given at the AFM by which time we should be in a position to confirm funding aspects, the proposed building schedule and the all important commencement date – during the summer (we hope).

NOTES FROM THE HON. SEC.

It is most encouraging to note the increasing popularity of the Sailing Club and the resulting influx of new members who are enjoying its facilities both on and off the water.

Rises in membership do, however, mean an added burden on the fabric of the club and its grounds, including the car and boat parks.

The Officers of the club would like to remind and inform members of a few basic guidelines which will assist the smooth running of the club.

The Bar

We are sure you will agree that improvements to the clubhouse, in particular to the bar and decking, have been a great success and it is pleasing to see so many members enjoying these added facilities.

Members are reminded of the legal requirement to sign in guests who are not members. This includes wives, husbands, partners and friends, etc. of Full, Associate and Junior members. Guests may only be signed in up to a maximum of 7 times during a year.

Work Parties

As you may be aware, Wells Sailing Club has always been a self-help organisation. Renovation, maintenance, grasscutting, land clearing, rescue craft preparation and handling, bar duties, etc., etc. have always been done by club members at no charge.

Work parties have sometimes been poorly supported. Information about future work parties will be posted on the club notice board. If you can help, please let the party organiser know in good time so that in the event of the date being inconvenient to the majority of helpers, it can be changed.

Annual Subscriptions

Reminder – if you intend to renew your subscription as a club member, please do so by March 31st, as after this date you will incur the extra expense of paying the \pounds 40 joining fee.

Bar Persons

As you are probably aware, the bar provides considerable income for the Club, which means that bills can be paid and subscriptions can be kept at a reasonable level. In addition to this, equipment for sailing and social events can be updated continuously.

We are always short of people to do a stint behind the bar, which is not difficult and can be fun.

If you are willing to help, please let us know as soon as possible so that we can plan a rota for the year.

Contact any of the Officers of the Club to volunteer and we will be delighted and grateful for your help. *Contact numbers are printed on the front of the Fixture list*

Car Parking

We are very fortunate to be allowed to park our cars so close to the clubhouse. Consequently, we are bound to adhere to the following to be able to continue to have use of the land.

- All vehicles should display the club sticker (available at the bar) when using the car park. Any vehicle not complying with this will be assumed to belong to a non member and will be asked to move.
- 2. Overnight parking is not permitted.
- 3. Park tidily so that as many vehicles as possible can be accommodated.
- 4. Remember to replace the chain at all times.
- 5. Parking in front of the clubhouse is only permitted for members while delivering or collecting, (e.g., sundries for social functions).

Membership Applications

If you are proposing or seconding new members, please make sure that they fill in the form accurately. Remember that proposers and seconders have to be members of at least 2 years' standing and should know the applicants well enough to say a few words on their behalf.

Boat Park

Because of the increased demand on a limited space, we are getting close to overspill into our land in the cutting. This is less convenient as it is further away from the slipway. The Sailing committee may request that boats which are sailed infrequently are moved to make way for those that are used regularly.

All boats are allocated a specific space on the park. Please adhere to this site. If you are bringing a boat to the club, please make sure you inform the Rear-Commodore, Martin Read, who will identify your personal site.
